{1.27.3} The things about this that most of all causewonder [thaumazein] for me are not known to all, and so I will write down what happens. Two maidens [parthenoi] dwell [oikeîn] not far from the temple [nāos] of Athena Polias. The Athenians call them Arrhephoroi. For a time they live their life [diaita] [there] at the place the goddess, but when the festival [heorte] comes round they ritually-perform [drân] at night the following. They place on their heads what the priestess [hiereia] of Athena gives them to carry [*pherein*]—neither she who gives it knows what it is that she is giving nor do they who carry [pherein] it understand what it is. Now, there is a precinct [*peribolos*] in the city, the precinct of Aphrodite-in-the-Gardens [kepoi], as she is called. It is not far away, and there is an underground descendingpassage [kathodos] that extends across it [= the precinct] not-artificially-but-naturally [automate]. By way of this passage the maidens descend [katienai], and, down below [*kato*], they leave behind the things they were carrying [pheromena] and they take [lambanein] something else that they bring-back [komizein], covered-up [kaluptesthal]. These maidens [parthenol], after this, they dismiss, and they now lead [agein] up to the Acropolis other maidens in their place.
